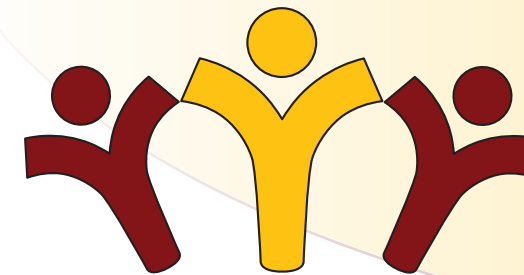

2015 IN REVIEW



We've been looking at the big picture lately, because being absorbed in the day to day tasks of running a shelter can obscure the impact we are actually having on kids and families. 2015 was a great year, and largely because of your help. In

review—last year we:

- » Served more kids
- » Provided more services
- » Utilized more individual and group volunteers and special projects
- » Accepted two tons (literally) of donations
- » Received financial contributions from many new individuals and organizations
- » Expanded our counseling program
- » Recruited and trained new employees
- » Began focusing on youth outreach

One question I am always asked when I speak to groups is, "On average, how long does a youth stay at The Door?" Our goal is to reunite kids to their families as quickly as possible. Last year we had much greater participation in our family mediation and reconciliation services. We are happy to see that our efforts are working—most kids return home within a week. We will continue encouraging youth and their families to work towards conflict resolution, whenever possible.

As we learn about providing shelter for teens, we realize that we still have work to do. We are doing a good job of reaching kids in school, but we need to improve our outreach to kids who have dropped out of school, who aren't connected with schools, and are on the streets. This year, we will focus on reaching out in creative ways to connect with the youth who need our services.

We have also been asking ourselves, "what else can we provide to help kids succeed?"

- » A home for pregnant and parenting teens?
- » A social enterprise or employment program?
- » A youth hang-out spot?

To help us answer this question, an AmericorpsVISTA member joined us to explore and develop ideas over the next three years.

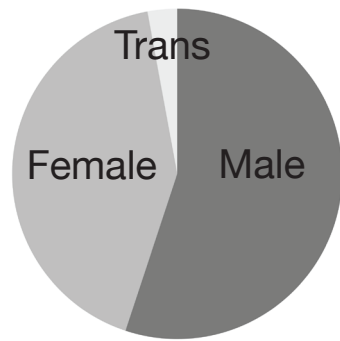

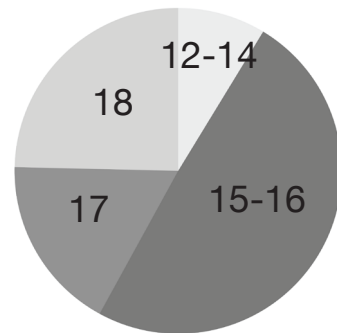

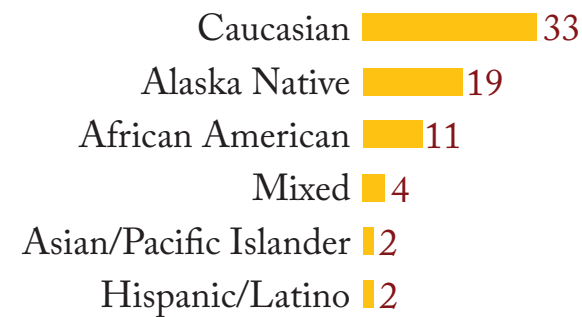
Gender



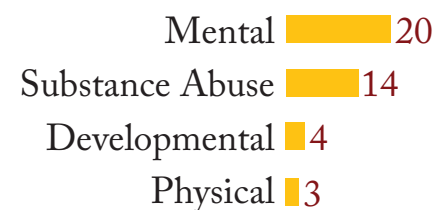
Age



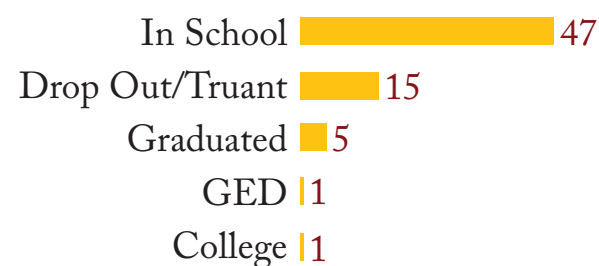
Ethnicity



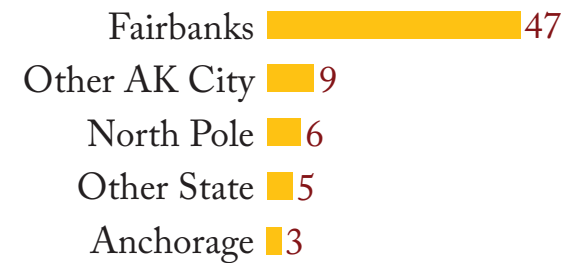

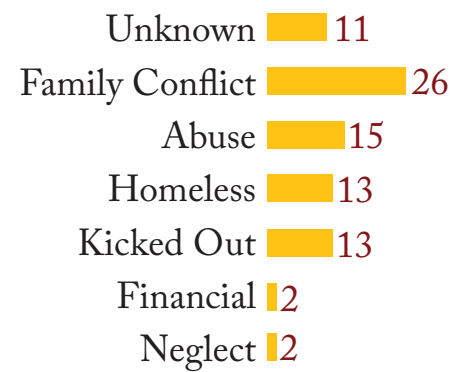
School Status



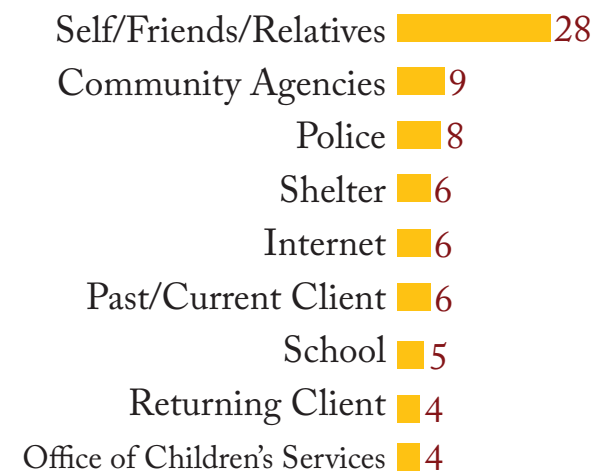

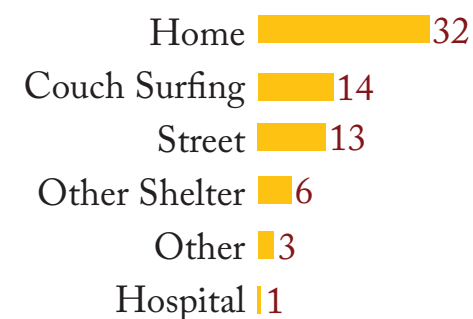
Reason for Seeking Shelter



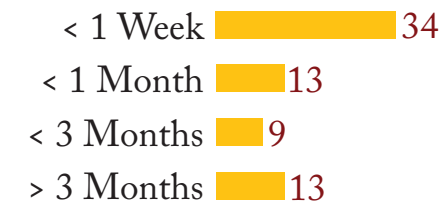

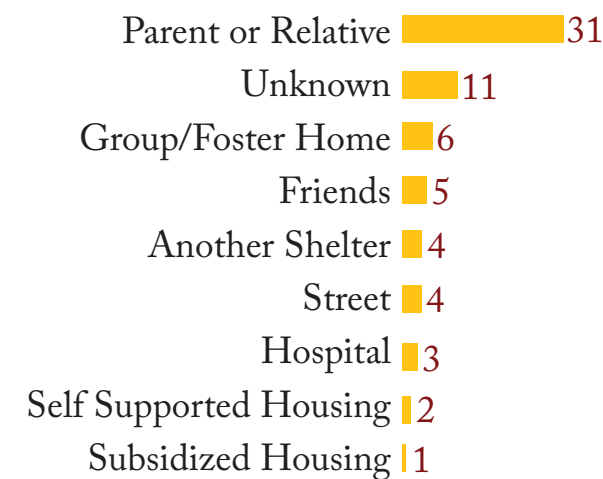

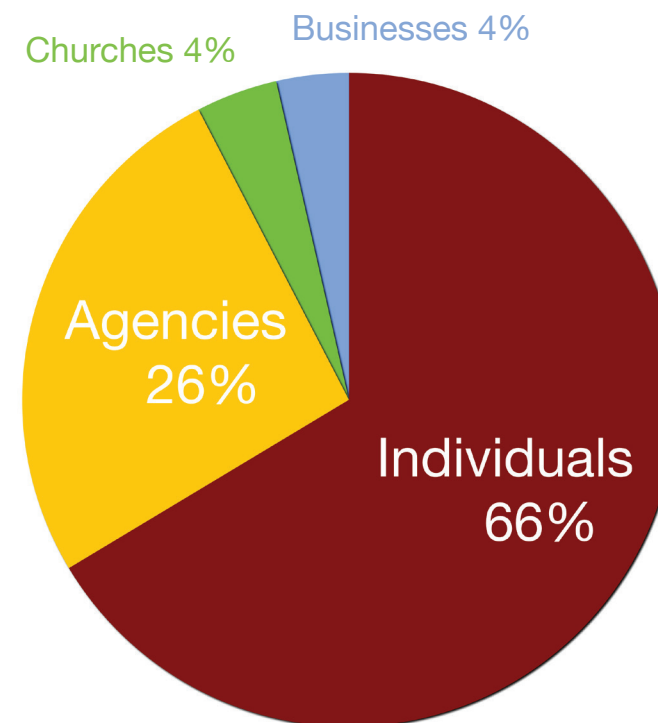
Duration of Stay

Rachel's Story

This year we were part of the stories of 69 young people. These stories are still being written and we know that their stay with us at The Door is only part of their journey.

Rachel stayed with us for many months in 2014 and 2015, after leaving her home due to family conflict and abuse. After a challenging year of transition, she is now thriving on her own. She has a job and an apartment, and reports that things are going really well.

She recently sent this message to share with the youth that come to The Door:

"I was a youth like you - struggling to comprehend life when all seemed hopeless. Trying to find direction but I didn't know what to do or where to turn. Fairbanks Youth Advocates stepped in and gave me a ray of light. They were my home when I didn't have one to go to. I am thankful for them. They gave me my drive and gave my life direction. Don't give up. I understand you might hear that on a daily basis. I'm saying it now because giving up is **NEVER** the answer."
